
must make a special mention of 4 Royal Bhutan Police Officers and 3 officers from Maldives Police Service, who were trained with the current batch.






to look back upon but has an inspiring example to set for future generations. It has to


They witnessed the Kumbhmela arrangements at Haridwar and as a novel experiment, they were attached to a police station in a district of their respective cadres to pick up the basics of police

They had an intense jungle survival and combat training module





Introduction of Mid Career Training Programmes for the IPS officers at NPA was a giant leap to ensure the continuous learning and development of the IPS Officers of various levels of seniority. Phase-III Mid Career Training Programme for the IPS Officers of 7 to 9 years of seniority was conducted in April-May, 2010, with 116

IPS Officers participating in this programme. It was conducted by Charles Sturt University, Austra-

lia in collaboration with the Indian School of Business, Hyderabad.

Phase-IV Mid Career Training Programme meant for the IPS Officers of 14 -16 years seniority will be held at the Academy on 22nd November, 2010. This programme will be conducted by the Cambridge University, U.K., in collaboration with OP Jindal Global Law School, Gurgaon. In July, 2010,


Phase-V Mid-Career Training Programme of 4 weeks duration was conducted in the Academy with 121 IPS



Officers of 24-26 years of seniority participating in the programme, organized by the Indian Institute of Management, Ahmadabad in collaboration with the London Business School, London. Various inservice courses were also conducted like Incident Management Course, Advance Course on Computer & Internet Crimes, Inter-Segment Criminal Justice System, Right to Information Act, just to name a few. At the instance of Hon'ble Union Home Minister, Shri P.

started conducting Tactics courses for police officers by establishing the Special Tactical Wing. So far, 20 such courses including an exclusive course for CRPF officers, have been conducted and 709 police officers including IPS officers have already attended the course. The Tactical Wing of the Academy has also conducted Tactics courses at Gujarat Police Academy; North Eastern Police Academy, Shillong;

Force – 1 Academy, Pune; and Karnataka Police Academy, Mysore.





Additional land of 400 acres is in

process of being procured for training in tactics. The Academy is also acquiring state-of-the-art equipment for Special Tactical Wing. During this year, the research activities at the National Police Academy have been revitalized to further strengthen the training function at the Academy. The studies on 'Effective Organization of Tactics Wing', 'Development of Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs)', 'Impact Evaluation of NPA Training', are being undertaken at the National Police

Academy by awarding research projects to the eminent police officers, both retired and serving.





A Project on 'Quality Audit of NPA' awarded to the Administrative Staff College of India, with a view to further improve the quality of NPA as a premier police training institution of our country, is also underway. The Standardization of Police Recruit Syllabus for Sub-Inspectors and Constables in the country has already been completed.

Besides publishing NPA News Letters and Journals of quality,

this year the publication wing of the Academy has

come out with valuable publications namely 'Appraisal of Forensic Reports and Judicial Proceedings', 'Case Histories in Crime Investigation', 'FAQs on Pistol'; 'FAQs on Rifles' and 'One Minute Drills'. Over the years the Academy has created excellent training and



learning infrastructure for facilitating learning. Initiatives have been



taken to establish a 'National Digital Crimes Resource and Training Centre' and a 'Virtual classroom' to connect all Police Training Centers, e-learning methodology and Knowledge Management architecture at NPA. For making the Academy a paperless organization, office automation exercise has also been takenup. I am, again, grateful and thankful to His Excellency the Governor of Andhra Pradesh, for sparing his valuable time to be

present on this august occasion. This is not only a momentous parade, but also an event of emotional bonding for the IPS trainee offi-



cers as they march today and peel off. If I may quote Theodore Roosevelt —"It is only through work and strife that either Nation or individual moves onto greatness. The great man is always the man of

mighty effort, and usually the man whom grinding need has trained to mighty effort." These nation builders of tomorrow have been chiseled, trained and hardened to tackle all the formi-



tioners. What a fabulous place to be in, the Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel National Police Academy and what a






accepted the warrant to become proud members of the Indian Police Service. I am extremely happy to

your worthy trainers and the Director. As a former member of the Service, I would like to share with you


that the service is not only about unremitting hard work day after day, which it is. It is no doubt a demanding mistress.




The families perhaps have a grievance that you are not there for them when needed. This is a dilemma, which every officer faces at one time or another. But at the end of the day the satisfying moments are those

lessly. This is a reward very special to any member of the Indian Police Service, which I too, cherish most dearly. And such redeeming moments are special to you and define you for what you are. The challenges confronting the police today are becoming increasingly complex demanding swift and decisive response. In the yester-years the problems were con-





gency and communal strife etc. These are compounded by the new menace of terrorism, which also has cross-border origins. The fabric of the nation is stretched as never before to cope with these challenges. You are called upon to deal with forces detrimental to the national security itself and preserve the unity and integrity of the nation. Quality of citizen's life in a society is directly related to the quality of policing. The citizen's expectations are ever on the increase. Not a day passes in any metropolis without a new crisis emerging on the

tense and a 24x7 phenomenon. We are witnessing growing disparities in the standards of living as the society is becoming increasingly consumeristic. The phenomenon of urban migration, with rootless people trying to find their moorings in a new environment, has added a new social dimension to the problem.





These new pressures have brought about an ascending crime graph. We are today witness to the emergence of mafia like organisations, which are ruthless. Cyber terrorism, using virtual world, is a new kind of menace the police forces are coping with. Terrorism, organised crime, and radical fundamentalism in its trans-national manifestations have attained menacing proportions. The internet and e-

commerce have arrived in a big way in our financial system but

bring along with it the attendant crimes of copyright infringement, hacking of networks, pornography and other cyber related crimes.

These are some of the challenges of 21st century policing and the question is - how well are you prepared to face these challenges. To put down these challenges, the police require quicker response mechanisms, empowered by high technology particularly surveillance mechanisms.






nism. These challenges require skills, which are to be constantly honed, coupled with an aptitude and constant up-gradation as well. The policeman of 21st century is no longer a mere lathi-wielding khakhi-clad individual called by mothers to silence a child. He has to

be adept at community policing and a leader to galvanise the community into becoming proactive. For this, you have

to win the minds and hearts of the community itself, being both sympathetic and empathetic. Your new role as partners of development process is yet another challenge ahead of you. This calls for a change in mind set and moving out of the confines of just battling crimes, fighting law and order issues and putting out fires. On



a daily basis the police would require altogether a new orientation and are expected to be sensitive to hu-





The 'enemy' of the State has the advantage of terrain and local support, which is largely due to misplaced propaganda. They have sophisticated weaponry and use state-of-the-art communication equipment. The odds are loaded against the police force by any reckoning and these are taking a heavy toll. In the face of such adversities, it is heartening to note that young probationers

in their first field postings in State after State have proved their mettle and leadership qualities. What has stood by them is the sound training and more importantly, their character.





Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel, a worthy and noble son of India, in whose cherished memory the Indian Police Academy is named, speaking in the Constituent Assembly emphasised the importance of All India Services and I quote ".... the Union will go, you will not have a united India, if you do not have a good All India Service, which has the independence to speak out its mind..", unquote.





CHIEF'S CAVIAR & CAVEAT....





The society has given you enough. In fact the society has given you a great deal. It has given you status, it has given you prestige and it has given you power. And it is time that you repay it with humility and service. You have no other choice but to be a good human being and a true professional policeman or woman. At this stage there must be a transformation in your life. Till now you have been mostly "takers" and society has given you plenty. Now that you have reached the top, there should be a role transfor-

mation. Those of us who have not been able to transform themselves and continue to "take" from the society, actually start consuming the resource of the nation and both the nation and its citizen are left miserable. Henceforth be a "giver".

You will be meeting many distressed people. They will come from long distances, probably missing on their daily wages, spending money on travel with a hope in their heart that you are the one who will relieve





them of their woes. Develop a mechanism to ameliorate their pain. In our country people are so simple and so naive that more than half their sorrows are relieved if someone gives them a patient and sympathetic hearing. Develop the art to listen and to console. There is no substitute for the personal touch and you must do that in your day-to-day dealings with the public. To be true to yourself and to the

profession, integrity is of paramount importance. You should have impeccable and

spotless integrity and this we must insist upon. And remember, integrity means not only monetary integrity, but also to be above all considerations of caste, creed, community, region and religion. You should develop the strength of character to be able to stand for RIGHT against all odds. Let truth be your motto and guiding principle





in whatever you do. Have the courage to stand by it. Let the NPA motto of 'Satya Seva Surakshnam' be uppermost in your mind, now and always.

You will have to lead to become a leader - there is no other short cut. You will have to lead by example and for that you will have to be mentally, physically and spiritually strong. You will have to practice what you preach. You will have to be fair, just and humane. You will have to build a team and maintain discipline. All your men

must be motivated to serve as a team and not as a bunch of individuals.

You will have to train men to become professional and act so. The strength of your character comes out more strongly through discipline, which you impose on yourself rather than the discipline, which is imposed upon you. So let the self-imposed discipline be reflected in every act and decision that you take. Take care of the social and security needs of your men, take care of their welfare, treat them like hu-

humane response from them. Give your subordinates their due credit, never usurp it. Empower them and you will have a thousand extra working hands for you.

Be consultative; but then consensus should mean discussion. Your men should tell you what they think, but then ultimately you decide.

> Be decisive, clear, and predictable. Remember that the right

decision is wrong if it is made too late. Support your men if they are right. Talk to your men whenever you get an opportunity. Change their attitude to work and attitude to people. The only way to motivate people is to communicate with them. It is important to talk to them in their own language. Their support is important to you.

'Sanghe shakti kaliyuge' - strength is in unity. You will have to love your men and lead with your heart.

And above all, do all this with a sense of detachment.


Along with obedience, you should have humility and perfect command over temper. Arrogance and swagger ill befit a young officer. In law-enforcement job you have to learn from everybody including your own sub-ordinates. Arrogance will create a wall of misunderstanding. Perfect command over temper is a must for an officer in uniform. Some of you have done very well during the

period of training and won prizes. Others, who are not prize-winners, should not get disheartened. I have



seen that non trophy winners have often done better both in life and in career. I cannot express this sentiment better than by quoting the lines of poet John Masefield: "I have seen flowers growing in stony places, acts of kindness done by men with ugly faces, the Gold cup won by the worst horse in races. I trust thee." I wish you well in your future service careers. A bright and challenging future beckons you. I, and when I say 'I', I include Mr. K. Vijay Kumar also, and my faculty shall find fulfillment in your success and achievements in the

service of the Nation. I shall quote the lines of Tagore and pray "God, those to whom you give your flag, give them also the strength to carry it". I wish you all the best in life! May God Bless You. Jai Hind.





BASIC TRAINING OF 62 RR

The 62 RR Basic Course with 119 officer trainees, including 15 lady officers, 4 officers from Royal Bhutan Police and 3 officers from Maldives Police Service, commenced on December 21, 2010. The training spread over 46 weeks aimed at imparting knowledge and skills and instilling appropriate attitude to prepare the officer trainees to be effective young leaders of the police force. The course was designed and conducted on a modular pattern.

During the course of training, the officer trainees interacted with eminent persons from different walks of life. Prominent among them being Dr. APJ Abdul Kalam, Shri M. K. 



Shri Atul Chetia has joined the Academy as HC (ADI) on deputation from CRPF on September 22, 2010.


FAREWELL
